ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD: On May 17, 2018, the ABAG Executive Board met and took the following actions:

1. State Legislation:

- ➤ AB 2923 (Chiu): BART Transit Oriented Development OPPOSED UNLESS AMENDED [League of CA Cities is opposed]. Vote was 13:11 (Eklund supported the opposed position)
- ➤ **SB 828 (Wiener)**: Regional Housing Needs Assessment and Allocation SUPPORT AND SEEK AMENDMENTS [League of CA Cities is <u>watch</u>]. Vote was 17:7 (Eklund opposed the support position)
- ➤ **AB 1771 (Bloom)**: Regional Housing Needs Allocation OPPOSE UNLESS AMENDED [League of CA Cities is watch). Vote was unanimous.
- ➤ SB 831 (Wieckowski) and SB 1469 (Skinner): Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU) SUPPORT AND SEEK AMENDMENTS. [League of CA Cities, CA State Assn of Counties, Urban Counties of CA, and Rural County Representatives of CA are opposed]. Vote 18:5 (Eklund opposed the support position)
- ➤ AB 2372 (Gloria): Floor Area Ratio Bonus SUPPORT [League of CA Cities is watch). Vote was 23:0 (Eklund abstained

2. SF Bay Economic Development District:

Approved staff request to submit an application to the US Economic Development Administration (US EDA) to designate the 8 County (with exception of Sonoma County who has previously received the designation) San Francisco Bay Area as a Regional Economic Development District (EDD). This designation will make jurisdictions and organizations in the Bay Area more competitive for grants and other programs from Federal and state agencies and foundations. ABAG developed a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy and obtained endorsements from a majority of the Bay Area counties on the vision, goals and objectives, and concept of an EDD.

3. Board Member Announcement:

Pat Eklund requested the ABAG Executive Board discuss either prepare a draft public participation plan for Plan Bay Area 2050 or 'piggy back' on the draft MTC public participation plan. The Executive Director will place this on a future ABAG Executive Board meeting and indicated that he would prefer that ABAG 'piggy back' on the MTC public participation plan.

Pat Eklund also thanked Brad Paul and Bobby Lu for participating in the Marin ABAG delegate/alternate meeting in April 2018; and, suggested that other ABAG Board Members may want to attend an upcoming meeting to get a better understanding of how we involve the ABAG delegates/alternates in Marin County in ABAG activities/issues.

4. North Bay Fires:

Henry Gardner, former ABAG Executive Director and Oakland City Manager, reported on lessons learned from his six-month work with the City of Santa Rosa on fire recovery and rebuild efforts (paid for by ABAG/MTC). Some of the lessons learned included:

- a) Consider establishing a higher reserve in your budget due to the immediate reduction in property and sales taxes. Recently, the State legislature approved a backfill of the loss revenue to the City of Santa Rosa and the County of Sonoma for 3 years; however, this is not automatic and is highly dependent upon the financial status of the State of CA;
- b) Immediately start working with FEMA on assistance for renters. Unfortunately, the City and County did not get ahead of this for renters, but did for homeowners. Many renters did not know that there is a 60-day deadline for submitting claims;
- c) Many of the homeowners/renters were either under insured and/or not insured at all (especially seniors who have paid off their mortgages). Need to encourage residents and property owners to be sure they are adequately insured to rebuild to current building standards.

- d) Document in writing all communications with FEMA including whether expenditures/claims are reimbursable. Unfortunately, unless well documented, FEMA's initial determination on whether an expenditure/claim will be reimbursed, has been reversed by the federal auditor causing communities who borrowed funds to fight the fire, or recover from a disaster have experienced a reversal of FEMA's initial decision on a claim by the federal auditor due to lack of documentation; and,
- d) Debris removal and contamination is a huge issue. Not only is the cost an issue, but how and where to take the debris. Sonoma County was lucky in that they had just created a new 'cell' in their landfill which was to last for decades. Unfortunately, 80% of the new 'cell' was filled with the debris from these fires.
- e) CEQA relief was critical for the re-build. It is not automatic and communities need to be prepared.
- f) Communities are never prepared enough. These fires strained everyone. Remember that mutual aid is not automatic it takes time for responders in other communities to respond and set up their efforts. So, communities are on their own and need to be better prepared.
