Following is an update on topics of note from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) meeting on January 26, 2022 and recent committee meetings. Please share this update with your membership.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

#### BAIFA

Bay Area Infrastructure Financing Authority (BAIFA), a joint powers authority composed of MTC and BATA, will restructure to serve as the tolling agency for State Route 37 and Bay Area express lanes, subject to legislative authorization and to provide enhanced regional transportation conduit financing. Membership of BAIFA will expand to include all the MTC Commissioners. The creation of a Tolling Committee has been recommended by MTC staff to include, among others, those Commissioners representing counties along Highway 37, including Marin, Sonoma, Napa and Solano. More discussion will follow on the composition of the Tolling Committee.

#### **OBAG 3 Program Framework**

The One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) program established the policy and programming framework for investing federal Surface Transportation Block Grant Program, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement, and other funds throughout the San Francisco Bay Area. TAM has worked closely with MTC staff, along with many others in developing the framework for Cycle 3. The framework continues many of the policies from prior cycles of OBAG, which helps ensure consistent policies and funding for transportation planning. The framework also weaves in emerging needs, such as Climate Resilience and Road Safety. County and Regional programs are equal partners with 50-50 shares of the overall program. The Commission adopted the overall program framework, and directed funding for ongoing planning and programming activities.

#### **Transit Oriented Community Policy**

Please keep an eye on a new proposal to update the Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Policy. This policy originally established corridor level development thresholds to support specified major transit expansions such as BART extensions and SMART. The new policy update proposed will target Transit Rich Areas as well as PDAs, and would tie regional discretionary funding for a wider range of transportation projects to

the local jurisdictions meeting a host of density and policy requirements. The proposed requirements go well beyond the prior policy in a few ways, including a longer list of transportation projects/types that would be subject to the policy, and a longer list of requirements that jurisdictions would have to meet, such as minimum density for commercial development, anti-displacement policies, parking management, and access.

Some of the questions we are asking MTC on this proposed update are:

- An understanding of the definition of "transit enhancements and improvements" and locations of where these proposed densities would be required.
- Careful consideration of how transit operators coordinate with local jurisdictions to develop station area improvements, including coordination with local transit operators.
- That regional transit projects or regional funding that provides a regional benefit be evaluated more broadly than through the lens of local development discussions.
- A phase in over time of the policy.
- Consideration of additional incentive based structures for transit rich areas, rather than a development density mandate.

The proposal was information only today, and is anticipated to come back to MTC for approval this Spring.

## ABAG Report to MCCMC<sup>1</sup>

January 2022

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

- 1) <u>Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA)</u>: On December 16, 2021, the ABAG Executive Board conducted a public hearing on the Final Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) Plan and adopted Resolution No. 13-2021 that approved the Final RHNA allocations for Bay Area jurisdictions between 2023 and 2031.
- 2) <u>Bay Adapt: Regional Strategy for a Rising Bay:</u> On December 16, 2021, the ABAG Executive Board adopted Resolution No. 15-2021 supporting the findings and recommendations identified in the Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) report entitled: <u>Bay Adapt: Regional Strategy for a Rising Bay</u>. BCDC is seeking support from cities and counties in the SF Bay Area and will brief the Marin Council of Mayors and Councilmembers on the Plan on February 23, 2022 at 6:00 pm.

**RHNA 2023 - 2031:** On December 16, 2021, the ABAG Executive Board conducted a public hearing on the Final Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) Plan and adopted Resolution No. 13-2021 that approved the Final RHNA allocations for Bay Area jurisdictions between 2023 and 2031. The vote was 16 Ayes: Adams, Andersen, Arreguin, Butt, Fligor, Halliday, Haubert, Hudson, Lee, Mitchoff, Moulton-Peters, Peralez, Rabbitt, Ramirez, Ramos, and Romero; 1 No: Eklund; and, 16 Absent: Bas, Breed, Canepa, Chavez, Esparza, Fife, Garcia, Hale, Hillis, Mahan, Mandelman, Mar, Miley, Spering, Taylor, and Wilson.

The Final RHNA Plan included the recommendation of the ABAG Administrative Committee to partially grant one of the 28 RHNA appeals filed by the County of Contra Costa. This appeal was partially granted because an area annexed to Pittsburg in 2018 was incorrectly included as part of unincorporated Contra Costa County in the Plan Bay Area 2050 Final Blueprint (the baseline allocation for RHNA methodology). As allowed by Government Code § 65584.05(e)(1), the Administrative Committee determined that 35 RHNA units should be transferred to the City of Pittsburg. The Final Plan can be downloaded at: <u>Final RHNA Allocation Report 2023-2031-approved 0.pdf</u>

Recently, ABAG received a January 12, 2022 letter from CA Housing and Community Development that stated: "HCD has completed its review and is pleased to approve ABAG's adopted RHNA Plan, upon finding it consistent with HCD's June 9, 2020 regional housing need determination of 441,176 housing units. Please distribute the RHNA Plan to inform all local governments of their share of new housing need to address their sixth cycle Housing Element by January 31, 2023. In updating their Housing Elements, local governments may take RHNA credit for new units approved, permitted, and/or built beginning from the start date of the RHNA projection period, June 30, 2022".

The next step in the process is for local governments to update the Housing Element of their general plan, due to HCD by January 31, 2023. #### Bay Adapt: Regional Strategy for a Rising Bay: On December 16, 2021, the ABAG Executive Board adopted

Resolution No. 15-2021 supporting the findings and recommendations identified in the Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) report entitled: <u>Bay Adapt: Regional</u> <u>Strategy for a Rising Bay</u>.

In 2019, BCDC, in collaboration with a Leadership Advisory Group (LAG) comprised of 35 Bay Area public, private, and non-profit leaders, embarked on developing "Bay Adapt," 28,000 socially vulnerable residents 20,

a consensus-driven strategy for regional sea level rise adaptation. The LAG included members from ABAG, MTC, the Regional Water Quality Control Board, State Coastal Conservancy, BART, East Bay Regional Parks, Army Corps of Engineers and Bay Restoration Authority as well as business, environmental justice, scientific and civic organizations, local government and academia.

The Bay Adapt Joint Platform is a consensus-based strategy comprised of 9 actions and 21 tasks that would enable the region, particularly local governments, to adapt faster, better, and more equitably to a rising San Francisco Bay. Its implementation would, among other things, reduce flood risks, increase technical assistance for local governments, recognize and equitably supporting low income, frontline communities and integrate adaptation into community-focused local plans. In fall 2020, a <u>BETA version of the</u> <u>HESS Tool</u> was made available to local planning staff, consultants, HCD, and subject-matter experts to explore and provide feedback. In October 2021, ABAG released an updated 1.0 version of the HESS Tool, which has been refined to incorporate feedback received from early users, including more granular screening categories, additional filters, an editing module to update underlying local land use data, and more. ## Highlighted Current Items From Past Meeting or Since Past Meeting

## 1. Commuter Ferry Service Tiburon and Sausalito

As of December 13, 2021, weekday trips for Sausalito and Tiburon ferry customers were increased and Tiburon customers will now enjoy direct service to and from San Francisco without stopping in Sausalito. The new schedules more than double the number of weekday trips between Sausalito, Tiburon, and San Francisco, giving passengers more options and flexibility for their weekday commute.

Previous schedules from Tiburon and Sausalito offered only one morning trip and one afternoon trip during the week. The increased service provides three morning trips from both Sausalito and Tiburon into San Francisco, and increased trips in the afternoons in both directions.

## 2. Golden Gate Bridge Announces Proposed Solution for Wind-Induced Sounds

Marin residents and others have complained about hearing sounds emanating from the Golden Gate Bridge during high wind. I am very pleased to report that at the last GGBHTD Board meeting, a proposed solution was passed to reduce or eliminate sounds during high winds events. District Engineers and leading bridge aerodynamics and acoustics experts believe that by installing thin U-shaped clips with a thin rubber insert attached to both edges of all the 12,000 vertical slats on the newly installed west railing, they can eliminate or substantially reduce the sound. Experts expect these will not be visible, will be painted the Golden Gate Bridge's famous International Orange, and expect to complete installation by the end of 2022.

## 3. Golden Gate Bridge District Unanimously Appoints Michael Theriault as New Board President

President Theriault was first appointed to the Bridge Board in 2011 and has had a distinguished career in the building trades as both an ironworker and business representative. He served as Secretary-Treasurer of the San Francisco Building and Construction Trades Council for 13 years where he negotiated and helped administer many successful project labor agreements, helped reestablish shop classes at the San Francisco Unified School District, and navigated the Council through financial uncertainty, among many other accomplishments. #### 101/580 Direct Connector

The GGBHTD Board of Directors received updates on design alternatives for a direct connector between northbound highway 101 and eat bound 580 from the Transportation Authority of Marin staff. The report informed preliminary considerations of increased transit service from Marin to the east bay. #### Bike Safety Regulations for bike travel on the Bridge

Safety regulations for bicyclist travel across the bridge were adopted. The regulations include an over all 15 MPH speed limit with a reduction when reasonable for safe operation, and, a 5 mph limit when traveling around the towers. The new regulations allowed operation of ebikes class 123, but prohibit pedestrian rolling conveyances.

#### Wind Induced Sound on the Bridge

The Board also approved the district engineer's proposed solutions to reduce wind induced sound generated on the bridge railings under certain conditions. The solution - aluminum clips with vibration dampening material installed on the western railings - was identified after extensive testing by bridge engineers and consultants.

#### Update on status of the ATU Pension

The NOV board received an actuarial presentation on the status of the underfunded ATU pension plan. Returns of previous investment advisors, pension spiking and the need for more contributions from all parties were identified as some of the contributors to the underfunded status.

#### **Status of GGBHTD Transit Funding**

The GGBHTD budgeted American Rescue Plan funds to cover budget deficits, specifically bus and ferry operations projected revenue deficit. The American Rescue Plan relief funding expected includes allocations made available from the Cares Act(Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act) and CRRSA (Corona Response and Relief Appropriation Act). The money was budgeted to cover about 50% of the revenue that would fund the District bus and ferry operations. However, the district, as all California Transit Districts, is facing the risk of ineligibility for these Federal Trade Administration grants.

All applications for this funding must be certified by Department of Labor. The required certification, 13C, attests that the transit agency has not infringed upon collective bargaining rights of employees. However, the Amalgamated Transit Union (ATU) filed a complaint to the

Department of Labor asserting that PEPRA, the California Public Employees' Pension Reform Act of 2013, violates collective bargaining rights. A complex legal process is ongoing. As of the last board meeting in December, the federal dollars had not been released to any of the California transit agencies including the District.

The uncertain funding status impacts potential future bus and ferry service. This loss of expected federal grant funds, along with toll revenue loss due to decreases in vehicle travel across the bridge and reductions in farebox recovery revenues due to decreased transit ridership, will have an impact on bus and ferry service until resolved.

#### **Status of Transit Service**

Resumption of ferry and bus service at before covid (bc) levels depends on external funding, bridge crossings and ridership demand. Ridership on many routes depends in part on the reopening of businesses, offices and on work schedules. Currently major employers have been supporting off site working. For data reflecting return to work in San Francisco, the Bay Area Council and MTC survey major employers on a month to month basis to track major employer re opening plans. Latest surveys indicate most employers are considering opening at least one day a week in the beginning of the year (2022), barring further uptics in the incidence of infection by COVID or variants. Based on this data at the link above and other considerations, including the expected revenues from the GGBHTD ferry service between Angel Island and San Francisco, GGBHTD ferries have resumed direct Tiburon to San Francisco commuter routes, bypassing Sausalito stop over. Larkspur ferry has increased its scheduled trips in recent weeks. Though many routes have been consolidated, several bus routes are planned to provide more robust service in the near future. MCCMC Legislative Committee Alice Fredericks Year End Report November 22, 2021.

There were no action items on the agenda for MCCMC Legislative Committee consideration in November and the committee does not meet in December. The California Legislature was in recess from end of Sept 2021 until Jan 3.

At the MCCMC Legislative Committee November meeting, Eric Wills, the new legislative analyst to the committee was introduced. The Committee received the following reports:

**David Jones, Emanuels Jones & Associate** described the \$13 billion surplus for the state budget, generated mostly by capital gains for the top 10% income brackets. About 30% of the reported job increases in the nation are in California, with most of them low paying jobs. A portion of the surplus must be used to replenish the required stat reserves – pegged at 15% of the budget.

**Kyra Ross of Emanuels Jones & Associates**, noted that the federal rescue plans include funds for library infrastructure, money., fire safety, including home hardening, \$5.2 billion for water supply for drought relief, including drinking water, stormwater, wastewater and recycling, \$270 million for the circular economy, recycling, and SB619 activity.

The state office of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and the attorney general are focusing on enforcement of housing requirements. Under recently passed bills, the attorney general has created a strike team of attorneys to enforce compliance with General Plan housing element requirements under the Housing Accountability Act. HCD has currently named 47 cities whose housing elements are non-compliant. 30 of them have resolved the issue.

Meantime, ACA 7 is circulating for signatures to place an initiative on the ballot to restore local control of land use to charter cities. There is no current polling on the success of signature gathering.

An unrelated initiative of interest is one to repeal the ban on flavored cigarettes

Nancy Hall Bennett, Public Affairs Manger, League of California Cities, North Bay

**Division,** reported on upcoming various informational meetings addressing issues of importance to cities. She will provide the committee with links. Meetings included a bay area joint divisions meeting Dec 1 on sea level rise, scheduled for early December. The Institute for Local Government, working with California State Association of Counties, the League of California Cities and the California Special Districts Association, provides information and resources to support local control and local government. Nancy provided information on a schedule of meetings of potential interest to the Legislative Committee including one with HCD to highlight the housing resources HCD is gearing up to provide local government.

**Summer Cassel, Senator McGuire's Office** reported that Senator McGuire was working with Mary Jane Burke on an 230 unit affordable housing project that would provide 115 units

for low and extremely low income families. She also reported on the Senator's Town Hall on the Department of General Services project to organize a the inventory of government surplus land. The activity is a result of the Govenors executive order 619

In response to Legislative Committee members urging that Sen McGuire help with infeasible RHNA numbers, Summer stated that the Senator is working to be helpful.

Anna Tamayo, Assemblymember Levine's Office reported the Assembly member's office was looking for future feedback on two year bills, AB 1445 and AB1522. AB 1445 would require a council of governments, a delegate subregion, or the department to include in their General Plan consideration of factors such as the following: evacuation route capacity, wildfire risk, sea level rise, and other impacts caused by climate change. Also requested was feedback on AB 1522 which would create a wildfire Insurance authority to serve as a marketplace for catastrophic wildfire insurance.

Transportation Authority of Marin Alice Fredericks Year End Report December 2021

#### Marin Sonoma Narrows Project Update:

Marin Sonoma Narrows (MSN) is a 17 mile stretch of 101 between Marin County and Old Redwood Highway in Petaluma. The MSN project will create HOV lanes and class one and two bikeways through the narrows. The current project segment runs from Route 37 to Novato. The ongoing project was delayed because of the current court challenge to Regional Measure 3 (RM3). RM3 increase the tolls for the 7 bay area bridges. The increased toll revenue is to be used for various safety and congestion relief infrastructure improvements including the MSN project. The court challenge is still on the docket of the California Supreme Court, but Metropolitan Tranportation Commission (MTC ) has released federal money to allow the MSN project to remain active. The last Six Mile segment of the MSN project went out to bid in November

#### Northbound Highway 101 to Eastbound Highway 580 connector project

At the Dec 13, 2021 meeting, the Transportation Authority of Marin (TAM) Board considered the six alternative designs of a project to provide a direct connector from northbound Highway 101 to eastbound 580 (includes access to the Richmond San Rafael Bridge). Among the alternatives eliminated were two that would have impacted Marin Sanitary Service plans for a biomass facility to address waste management requirements of SB 1383. The remaining alternatives were discussed relative to costs, impacts on open space and businesses, access to communities, mass of required structures, and potential throughput of vehicles (which would affect the current congestion on present approaches). The Commission voted to eliminate alternatives 1A, 1B, 3B, 4 and 5, leaving the following alternative designs for further study:

Alternative 2 – Exits 101 midway between the top of Cal Park and the current Bellam off ramp. Travel speeds are 45 miles an hour. A new bridge will be built to cross Anderson Drive and travel will continue over SIM St. where it connects to Highway 580. The design alternative requires purchase of Simm Street property

Alternative 3A - creates a low speed curve that reduces travel speeds to 35mph through the proposed connector and exists in the vicinity of the current Bellam exit.

Alternative 6 - exits 101 midway between the top of Cal Park Hiss and the current Bellam offramp. This design alternative impacts open space, Golden gate bus yard, some businesses, the Marin Sanitary service facility. This alternative also has possible compatibility issues with any westbound and southbound connector.

## **Consideration of Request for Formation of a City/County Services Subcommittee**

MCCMC membership is asked to approve formation of a temporary subcommittee to better understand the services provided by the County and how they are funded.

The following is the committee description as drafted by the Marin Managers:

In recent years, challenging issues such as homelessness, mental health, and disaster preparedness have produced new and sometimes innovative partnerships between Marin's eleven cities and the County. In pursuing these partnerships, though, tension and misunderstanding have occasionally developed – particularly as city leaders try to understand the mandates, commitments, and funding sources of the County.

Funding is a concern for all local government and as the County seeks partnerships with the cities, it is important that councils make informed decisions about the investment of city funds and resources. It is proposed that MCCMC form a committee to better understand the services provided by the County and how they are funded. Through the work of the committee, we hope to better identify the most strategic opportunities for collaboration that will return the greatest benefit to Marin's residents.

If formation of the subcommittee is approved, each city or town wishing to participate will be asked to nominate up to two councilmembers to participate on the subcommittee.

The first 3 announcement I wanted to make is that, I was appointed to the League of California Cities Committee to evaluate the constitutional amendment number seven, and also the initiative 4 5 number 21-0016. What that constitutional amendment and initiative does, is it prohibits the State 6 from changing our land use and zoning requirements, and it actually goes back retroactively. 7 So all of the legislation since the 1950s affecting our land use and the way the League is looking at it, affecting our land use and zoning, if it's something that is contrary to what we have as local 8 9 governments, then it's off the books, which is great. 10

11 The other announcement I wanted to make is Mark Milberg is our new city council member. He was sworn in this morning and he was voted in by the four, got a four-zero vote. So it was 12 unanimous. We are characterized by 4 predominantly small cities and suburban and rural land use patterns, with interest in sustainable 5 agricultural technology, small business, open space, and environmental preservation and 6 tourism. And I think our board will probably be taking a strong position that Marin County has 7 much more of a community interest with Sonoma County and the rest of the North Coast versus 8 Napa and Solano counties to the east.
